5. PRESENTATIONS

A. OHM: On Street Parking

Present: Matt Parks, OHM

Parks provided Council with the Grand River Road diet data results. He stated Grand River is absolutely right for some kind of a road diet down the road.

Parks advised a proposed road diet would eliminate the second eastbound through lane, providing space for additional street enhancements. He stated in order to better define the impacts of the removal of this travel lane a trial closure was requested by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT).

Parks stated the collected data from the trial closure was processed and reviewed by OHM Advisors. Traffic volumes with the lane closed were within 5% of the volume with the lane open. This is within the normal daily traffic fluctuations and indicates that the closure of the lane did not cause a substantial number of people to alter their routes.

Parks informed Council that MDOT is planning a mill and overlay project on Grand River in 2017. He stated this would be a great opportunity to incorporate various road diet pavement markings. This provides an excellent opportunity to test a road diet prior to spending significant money on a total reconstruct.

Scott discussed the importance of communicating to MDOT the City's objective of reducing a lane on Grand River, moving towards road quieting, and promoting a more pedestrian-friendly community.

Responding to a question from Schneemann, Parks confirmed data supports reducing a west-bound lane on Grand River west of Farmington Road.

Schneemann stated that in addition to reducing both eastbound and westbound lanes on Grand River from Farmington Road to Shiawassee, he would like to see a 25 mph speed limit.

Schneemann asked who is responsible for ensuring the city's desire for bike lanes, road diet, etc. is communicated to MDOT so that it is part of the 2017 mill and overlay project.

Parks advised a committee including himself, city representatives and a Councilmember should be formed to ensure the pressure stays on MDOT to address the city's objectives for Grand River. He stated MDOT will start the planning process of the mill and overlay sometime early 2016.

Schneemann noted this is a high priority that will change the downtown and the way in which it is used.

October 19, 2015

McShane pointed out other cities have done the type of road diet Farmington is considering. She asked if any consideration has been given to diverting traffic to M-5 through signage or otherwise.

Discussion followed regarding the need for increased walkabilty and pedestrian safety at crosswalks.

B. Recycling update, Miss Farmington Sydney Schrand

Sydney Schrand, 2015 Miss Farmington, was present to provide an update on a recycling survey conducted on the downtown businesses. She advised a majority of the businesses supported recycling.

Gina Adams-Levy, representing the charity, "Peace, Love and Planet", was also present to discuss some of the barriers to recycling and how they can be overcome.

6. MAINTENANCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH PARKING LOT

1. Motion to approve a bid from Surface Sealing, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$6600 for repairs to the Methodist Church parking lot.

Eudy advised the City through a mutual understanding with the First Methodist Church is responsible for maintenance of their parking lot that includes sealcoating and striping. He stated the Church has advised the City that repairs are necessary to avoid injuries due to the uneven condition of the lot.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT

Laura Best, 32718 Grand River, a new resident to Farmington, spoke about the article she read in the Observer regarding historic homes being torn down to make room for more retail. She expressed opposition to the removal of these homes on Grand River. She was attracted to Farmington because of its charm and historic homes.

Melody Jaske, 20962 Larkspur, expressed opposition to the removal of the historic homes.

Karla Aren, 22814 Brookdale, a member on the Farmington Board of Review and Zoning Board of Appeals, also expressed opposition to the removal of the four Queen Ann homes on Grand River.

Mayor Galvin noted that contrary to what has been stated or written, Council did not make decisions in closed session.

4. BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

A. Consideration to Approve the Historical Commission Members' Resignations

City Administration requested Council accept the resignations of members on the Historical Commission.

Scott expressed regret that this matter had reached this level. He believed there was a better way to handle the issue.

Schneemann expressed disappointment that the resignations occurred in this manner.

Cowley discussed the benefits of tax growth, the Vision Plan as a basis for making decisions, and the importance of increasing density in the downtown.

Galvin spoke about the many different opportunities to serve in the community. He would like to see more Historical Commission members who actually live in historical homes in the Historic District.

Motion to accept the resignations of Jena Stacy, Marilyn Weimer, Maria Taylor and Jim Atkinson from the Farmington Historical Commission.

5. PUBLIC SERVICES

A. Consideration to Accept Bids for Twin Valley Pump Station Improvements

Present: Matt Parks, OHM Representative

City Administration advised five proposals were received for the Twin Valley Pump Station improvements. The low bid was received from Bidigare Contractors, a contractor recommended by OHM.

Parks detailed the project and the bid process. He advised Bidigare has done work for the city before. He requested a contingency budget to facilitate moving the project forward.

Eudy explained that they are increasing capacity to the Twin Valley Pump Station in an effort to facilitate growth.

Responding to a question from Cowley, Parks explained that the pump station is dated and needs work in order to provide service more efficiently and safely to the residents of

Farmington.

Responding to a question from Schneemann, Parks stated they felt the Bidigare proposal was a fair one. He again expressed support for a contingency budget in order to deal with some of the unknowns that might be encountered on the project.

Scott reviewed the details of the line items, with the pump station being the largest of them which included the price of the pump. He inquired about the construction of the building and the timeline for the completion of the project. He then asked if there will be any road disruption and Parks responded it will be minimal, entailing possibly a lane closure at best.

Cowley asked about the age of the infrastructure. Eudy responded it was built in the mid 1950's with some minor updates in the late 1970's as well as some minor electrical work being done in the mid 1990's.

Galvin asked if there was a concern about back-ups occurring in homes during the project. Parks responded they will build the new pump station first and test it before they take out the old one which will minimize the likelihood of any problems. He then inquired if there was concern about pollution in the river and Parks responded in the negative.

On an inquiry by Galvin, Murphy responded that the funding for the project will be coming from the Capital Improvements Fund and a twenty year bond from Oakland County. The bond will be paid back with water and sewer fees and further discussion was held.

Motion to accept the bid of Bidigare Contractors, Inc., 7820 Chubb Road, Northville, Michigan 48167, in the amount of \$739,869.00 for the Twin Valley Pump Station Improvements, including a \$70,000.00 Contingency Budget (approximately 10 %) for a total construction budget of \$809,856.00.

6. ORCHARD LAKE - TEN MILE PLACEPLANS PROJECT

A. Consideration to Accept the Orchard Lake-Ten Mile Roads PlacePlans Project

Christiansen advised that at the June 17, 2015 Orchard Lake and Ten Mile PlacePlans Project meeting, the final report and design proposal for the future redevelopment and enhancement of this area was presented to both the City of Farmington and Farmington Hills. The purpose of this item on tonight's agenda is to review the plan and accept it as part of the City of Farmington Master Plan and Comprehensive Planning Program. The report was reviewed and accepted by the Planning Commission at its October 12, 2015

meeting and was included in the Council packets for tonight's meeting. He stated this project was a joint effort between Farmington and Farmington Hills, working together with the Michigan Municipal League, as well as Lawrence Institute of Technology and their design program.

Galvin inquired as to when this area was looked at last and Christiansen responded it has not been looked at in quite a long time, at least not during his tenure with the City. He stated it was part of the Master Plan that was last updated in 2009, but not with any specificity to this area.

Christiansen reviewed the Orchard Lake Road and Ten Mile Intersection Redesign Analysis Report and Design Proposal for PlacePlans with Council.

Schneemann asked about the possibility of the north/south lanes being reduced to one in each direction and further discussion was held.

Scott stated the idea behind this plan was to seek alternatives for that part of town, including becoming more pedestrian-friendly.

Cowley stated that a traffic count is a significant element in attracting the right kind of businesses and merchants to the city and further discussion was held.

Galvin stated that Ten Mile and Orchard Lake Road is an area that has been underserved by planning initiatives. He was happy to see an area plan for that location. He also indicated that the comment section of the report was of particular interest to him which included criticisms and wish lists of residents. He then inquired what the next steps would be in the process and how do we go forward from a concept plan to reality.

Christiansen responded that some level of implementation would be needed to bring this plan forward and stated that financing is a big key. He stated the next step would be for Council to provide direction and then seek funding sources.

Galvin discussed a Council goal-setting session scheduled for sometime in January which will likely include the Ten Mile and Orchard Lake Road area. He thanked Christiansen for the report and those who participated in the collaborative effort.

8. PUD AMENDMENTS

A. Grand River-Halsted Plaza PUD Amendment

Present: Thomas Duke, Thomas A Duke Company

Christiansen provided background on this Planned Unit Development (PUD) project, stating it is before Council in order to modify the required approved screening wall on the east side of the site and the Tile Shop. He advised challenges had been found in the soil conditions on the east side of the property along the wall and indicated that Thomas Duke was present to describe the obstacles they have encountered. He indicated that there may be some site plan changes and they had been discussed with Attorney Schultz.

Schultz advised that what is being proposed are changes to the screen wall which is part of the PUD Agreement. He indicated the proponent is proposing a cyclone fence as opposed to the screen wall originally presented.

Christiansen stated there are two different plans in the Council packets, one being the plan for the Tile Shop renovation, and the second one being the engineering plans for the site. He detailed the engineering plans and cited the problems that they had encountered regarding the screen wall. He then indicated the changes that need to be made to the plan.

Thomas Duke then described the challenges on the site and further discussion was held as to the amendments that needed to be made to the agreement.

Galvin thanked Duke for his update on the project.

B. Riverwalk of Farmington PUD Amendment

Present: Sam Harb, Windmill Group

Christiansen requested Council consideration of an amendment to the Riverwalk project to modify or reduce an approved setback for Lot 9 of the project. He noted any modifications to a PUD must be approved by council.

Christiansen advised that on Lot 9 the Petitioner is requesting a slight modification of the front yard setback to accommodate a portion of the garage located on the north side of the lot.

Harb stated that the house on that lot has been sold and they would like to begin construction.

Further discussion was held on this item and Attorney Schultz stated that any changes to the PUD must go before Council and described the steps involved in the process.

Christiansen thanked Mr. Harb and the Windmill Group for being a pleasure to work with on this project.

Galvin thanked Mr. Harb and his group for investing in Farmington.

4. AUDITORS TO PRESENT ANNUAL AUDIT

Present: Plant Moran representatives: Dave Helisek, Kari Shea and Justin Kolbow

Murphy introduced Dave Helisek, along with team members, Kari Shea and Justin Kolbow, who presented the results of the Farmington audit for year ended June 30, 2015.

Helisek advised Plante Moran once again was able to give the City's financial statements an unmodified opinion which is the highest level of assurance that can be given. He stated that means the statements as presented fairly reflect the financial position of the City as of June

30, 2015.

There were changes that had been discussed in previous years that were implemented for the first time this year, including the adoption of GASB No. 68, which brought pension liability onto the face of the statements. Helisek advised the City's pension fund is 88% funded actuarially, which is excellent.

Kolbow provided an audit presentation covering General Fund revenues and expenses, revenues and expenses by governmental activities, and Water and Sewer Fund cash flows. He advised that the City's General Fund ended with a \$2.6 million balance, and noted \$2.1 million of that amount was unassigned or 27% of the Fund. He noted 27% is above the City's goal of 25%, which leaves the city well positioned.

Shea briefly reviewed Plante Moran's official letter to the City including: general information regarding the audit process and legislative and informational items. She commented on the fact that this letter is usually in three sections, including a section identifying any material weakness or significant deficiency, but there were none this year. She noted that this was an uncommon occurrence, and referenced the work put in by Weber and Norgard.

Shea also pointed out several items of interest within the letter to the City: future GASB Statements that will impact the City for Post-employment Benefits Standards; Revenue Sharing; Federal Grant funding; new FOIA regulations; and requirements for Act 51 monies and performance audits.

Discussion followed regarding post-employment benefits other than pensions (OPEB) bond liabilities, assets and rating changes, and coming changes in reporting.

Galvin recognized the time and effort put into the audit by City Treasurer Weber and Controller Norgard and thanked Plante Moran for attending.

Weber cited Norgard as instrumental in the success and smooth running of this year's audit.

5. RRRASOC: CURBSIDE CLOTHING RECYCLING

A. Consideration of Proposed Curbside Clothing Recycling Pilot

Present: Mike Csapo, RRASOC; Bill Wilk, Simple Recycling

Murphy provided background on Curbside Clothing Recyling. He stated RRRASOC established a program through Simple Recycling to encourage the reuse and recycling of used clothing and household goods. The program is currently being successfully operated in South Lyon, Wixom, and Walled Lake, as well as other communities. There are no costs to the City or RRRASOC, and in fact, will pay RRRASOC \$.01/lb.

Csapo reviewed the background of the program and discussed the dynamic between recycling and the donation of clothing and household goods to charitable organizations. The pilot curbside programs worked well and provided a way for items no longer needed to go back into the value chain as opposed to going into landfills. He discussed the details of collection and disbursal of the material, and requested the opportunity to deploy this program in Farmington. Csapo then detailed the specifics of collection and homeowner education implemented by Simple Recycling.

Scott questioned whether trash pickers will create issues with Simple Recycling collection. Csapo indicated that though there is not a large problem with this, scrappers have been prosecuted in past. Pick up issues were also discussed.

Schneemann inquired about whether the City can get out of a written agreement if the City decides it does not want to continue. Csapo agreed to build that into the agreement.

Motion postponed to December agenda for further discussion.

6. CITY COUNCIL APPOINTMENT TO GRAND RIVER CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENT AUTHORITY

Murphy advised that at the November 9th Council organizational meeting, an appointment to the Grand River Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA) was omitted. Scott volunteered to continue as the Mayor's designee to the CIA.

MONTHLY REPORT NOVEMBER 2015

LARCENY FROM AUTO

On November 3rd at 5:19 PM, officers were dispatched to the 33000 block of Slocum for the report of a vehicle that had been broken into. Officers spoke with the victim who stated she was at an area business for about 10 minutes and when she returned to her vehicle she found the window had been broken out. The Department wishes PSO LaPorte all the best in his new career with the City of Farmington.

Grant permission for RRRASOC to deploy a program for the curbside collection and recycling of clothing in the City of Farmington.

Overview

As you are aware, RRRASOC has established a program for the curbside collection, reuse, and recycling of used clothing and household goods through an agreement with Simple Recycling. The program is currently operating successfully in South Lyon, Wixom, and Walled Lake, as well as a number of other communities in Michigan and the U.S.

Simple Recycling provides a unique, turnkey operation for the collection of the material on the same day as the regular collection of trash, recycling, and yard waste. There are no costs to the cities or RRRASOC, and Simple Recycling pays RRRASOC \$.01 per pound.

The program seeks to harvest material that is currently NOT being donated to charitable organizations. To date, RRRASOC has received no complaints from charitable organizations that rely on the donation of used clothing and household goods. RRRASOC also continues to promote and encourage charitable giving as an alternative to discarding reusable items in the trash.

Since the inception of the program, more than 120,400 pounds of used clothing and household goods have been collected in the RRRASOC communities and delivered back into the value chain.

The program has been reviewed and endorsed by the RRRASOC Board of Directors.

Key Features

- According to EPA, U.S. households discard approximately 70 pounds of used clothing every year. Only about 15% of that material is currently donated for reuse. The clothing collection targets the remaining 85% that currently ends up in landfills. The program will encourage residents to continue to donate used clothing to the charity of their choice.
- Simple Recycling will be responsible for program promotion and distribute specially marked bags to each household, into which residents can place their used clothing. The bags can be placed at the curb on regular trash day for collection by Simple Recycling, who will then leave new bags for the homeowner. The City's regular solid waste contractor, Waste Management, is aware of and supports integrating the collection with the regular collection schedule, particularly since it will reduce the amount of trash they have to deliver to the landfill.
- There will be no costs to RRRASOC or the City of Farmington. Simple Recycling handles all calls and questions concerning the program through direct number provided by Simple Recycling.
- The collected material will enter into the already established supply chain managed by Simple Recycling and its downstream partners. Much of the material will enter into the thrift store network in southeast Michigan for resale. Material not suitable for domestic resale will either be diverted to overseas resale markets or recycled in the textile recycling market.

Representatives from RRRASOC and Simple Recycling will be available to answer any questions you or the City Council may have and provide additional material concerning the program.

<u>Description:</u> Consideration to Purchase Temporary Enclosures for Sundquist Pavilion

Requested Action:

Authorize the purchase of enclosures for the Sundquist Pavilion from Marygrove Awning at a cost not to exceed \$7,000.00, the funding for which shall be derived from the transfer of \$3,500.00 from the Farmington DDA and \$3,500.00 from the General Fund.

Background:

Over the years, city officials and the DDA have discussed the idea of installing enclosures at the Pavilion to act as a weather barrier during events or other activities. The overhead heaters are ineffective in cold weather as there is no means to contain the heat generated and it dissipates quickly. Previous attempts to address this with plastic sheeting have been ineffective. The need has been more pronounced since the installation of the Riley Park Ice Rink in the winter of 2013-2014. The Pavilion would become a better warming station and place to change into skates if heaters were operated consistently and the effects from wind and winter weather conditions were reduced.

To be cost-effective, staff has researched the installation of metal-framed vinyl panels that would be installed on the south side of the Pavilion. The north side and wings would remain open for easy access and visibility of the ice rink and park area of Riley Park. Costs for the installation of panels, per estimates from suppliers, would run approximately \$6,800. At this time, neither the City nor the DDA has this item included in their respective FY2015-2016 budgets. At its December meeting, the Farmington DDA agreed to allocate \$3,500.00 from proceeds from this year's Harvest Moon Celebration to fund a portion of the temporary enclosures. The \$3,500 from the General Fund will be charged to the Parks Department.

The Design Committee had an opportunity to review the conceptual rendering and recommended the selection of the color "cocoa" for the top and bottom of each panel, which would be separated by a band of clear vinyl for improved visibility and light penetration. The life expectancy of the panels would be 5-7 years.

Other options were investigated that included mechanically-operated roll-up awnings; while these other options may be more advanced and offer greater utility, the limited funding opportunity factored into the choice for vinyl panels.

Please refer to the attachments to view the conceptual rendering, color chart and evidence of the proposals that were collected.

If approved, the lead time for installation is approximately six weeks, or January, 2016.
