RESOLUTION NO. _____ RESOLUTION SUPPORTING STATUTORY REVENUE SHARING REFORM "REVENUE SHARING TRUST FUND"

At a meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, held on theday of, 2024, at the City Hall, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48335 the following resolution was offered by and supported by
The City of Farmington, along with other local units of government in Michigan relies on State Revenue Sharing to provide general fund services to its residents; and
State revenue sharing in Michigan is divided into two types: constitutional and statutory, with the latter being subject to legislative appropriations; and
Through the State government's annual appropriation process, actual statutory revenue-sharing payments to cities, villages, townships, and counties have been below full funding each year since 2001,
In 2023, the City of Farmington received \$278,884 less in statutory revenue-sharing payments than it did

This reduction in statutory revenue sharing is a cumulative \$8,743,215 over the past 20 years that has placed an undue financial strain on the City of Farmington and other Michigan cities, resulting in a reduction of essential services or increased local taxation, both of which adversely affect residents;

in 2003; and

The 2023 State budget allocated \$530 million in Statutory Revenue Sharing to be distributed to all cities, villages, townships, and counties through its annual appropriation process;

In October 2023, The State House of Representatives voted 106-4 to amend the Michigan Trust Fund Act and the General Sales Tax Act, respectively, to establish a "Revenue Sharing Trust Fund" that would distribute money from sales tax revenue to local units of government;

The act creates a stable and predictable revenue source by dedicating a portion of sales tax revenue for annual statutory revenue sharing payments dedicated for cities, villages, townships, and counties; and

The recent Growing Michigan Together Council Report highlighted the need for continued local investment and the importance of the relationship between thriving local communities, population growth, and positive local economies; furthermore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Mayor and City Council of Farmington hereby ask our State Representatives and Governor Whitmer's administration to support the adoption of House Bills 4274 and 4275.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Clerk share copies of this resolution with neighboring municipal jurisdictions

Proposed Motion:

Discuss enhancing walkability by narrowing some of the downtown streets to highlight the historical Interurban Railroad that ran through Farmington in the early 1900s.

Background:

During the construction of Dinan Park, contractors uncovered parts of the interurban railroad that ran through Farmington in the early 1900s. This spurred an initiative aimed at enhancing the walkability of our city while simultaneously highlighting a remarkable historical feature: the buried 1900 railway located beneath Grand River Avenue and Farmington Road.

As we strive to create more pedestrian-friendly environments, this proposal presents an opportunity to not only prioritize the needs of pedestrians but also celebrate our city's rich heritage during our bicentennial year.

This railway, once a vital artery of transportation in our city, holds significant historical value and offers a unique glimpse into our past. However, its buried state has relegated it to obscurity, with many residents and visitors unaware of its existence.

To celebrate the historical significance of the buried railway, we envision incorporating interpretive signage, interactive displays, and artistic installations along the revamped pedestrian paths. These features will educate residents and visitors about the railway's history, significance, and its role in shaping our city's development.

Our proposal seeks to transform the downtown into a pedestrian-friendly zone by narrowing the street, reclaiming space for pedestrians, and integrating features that highlight the buried railway. By reducing the width of Grand River Avenue, we aim to slow vehicular traffic and create a safer and more inviting environment for pedestrians with wider sidewalks, pedestrian crossings, and dedicated bike lanes. These enhancements will prioritize the safety and convenience of pedestrians and cyclists, encouraging active modes of transportation.

We plan to seek grants that support historic preservation.
