I am pleased to share that overall serious "Group A" crime was down almost three percent (-2.7%) in 2008. The decrease is impressive following a twelve percent (-12%), "Group A", decrease in 2007. "Group A" offenses are defined as the most serious twenty (20) criminal offenses.

There were 496 "Group A" crimes in 2008, fifteen (15) fewer than 2007 and eighty-three (83) fewer than 2006.

There were no actual murders in 2008, but one (1) murder statistic was required to be reported as a result of the department solving a cold case murder. Commander Frank Demers re-investigated the execution murder and robbery that occurred on January 27, 1979, at the former Great Scott supermarket on Orchard Lake Road, south of Ten Mile. Two (2) persons were arrested in 2008 and are expected to stand trial in 2009.

Notable "Group A" crime decreases included four (4) fewer sex offenses (-40%), nine (9) fewer assaults (-9.3%), six (6) fewer burglaries (-15.4%), sixteen (16) fewer larcenies (-10.5%), and seven (7) fewer drug violations (-8.9%).

There were six (6) armed robberies in 2008, one (1) more than in 2007. Four (4) of the armed robberies were closed by arrest.

The department experienced a 61.5% increase in auto thefts during 2008. Twenty-one (21) vehicles were stolen, compared to thirteen (13) in 2007. Several area departments experienced an increase in stolen cars, possibly related to the poor economic condition in southeast Michigan and the profit of reselling auto parts.

There were 647 total "Group B" offense (-1.2%) in 2008, eight (8) fewer than 2007. The 182 drunk driving arrests were the highest totals in eight (8) years, and nineteen (19) more than 2007.

Total "Group C" incidents decreased 4.8%. There were 4,957 incidents, 249 fewer than 2007. Traffic crashes decreased 21.1%, eighty-seven (87) fewer than the 413 crashes in 2007. There were 770 calls for medical services, seventeen (17) fewer (-2.2%) than 2007.

Two (2) separate accidental deaths saddened the Farmington community in 2008. On May 10th, a resident on Hillcrest died after falling from his roof. On November 29th, a Farmington

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Hills man was killed at the downtown Farmington library when he was struck by his own driverless vehicle.

There were forty (40) actual fires in 2008, four (4) more than 2007. There were no fire fatalities. Two (2) teens were severely burned when gasoline was poured onto a backyard bonfire on New Year's Day.

The public safety department implemented four (4) new technologies in 2008; Electronic Business Alerts, E-Ticket (electronic ticket writing), Electronic Medical Reporting (EMR), and Electronic Vehicle Impound Tracking. The department has added twenty-seven (27) new technologies to enhance services to the public since 2005. The department also serves the public with sixty-six (66) crime prevention and community service programs.

It should be noted that crime data figures contained in this report and the attached supporting crime statistics, may contain slight number variations. This is due to the ongoing reclassifications of unfounded crimes, false police reports, matters determined to be civil, items reported stolen that were misplaced, lost property determined to be stolen, etc. Crime data may also contain slight number differences depending on the date the data was queried.

On behalf of the proud members of the Farmington Safety Department, we thank the city officials for your support. I am pleased to present the 2008 Annual Report.

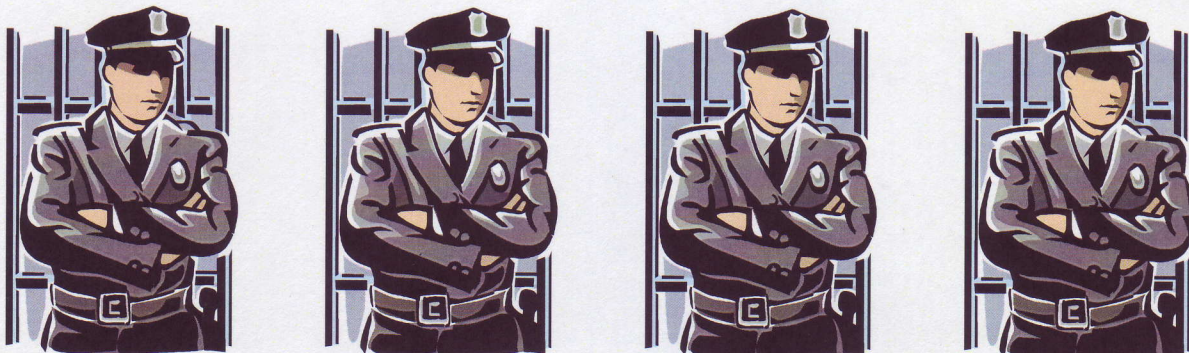

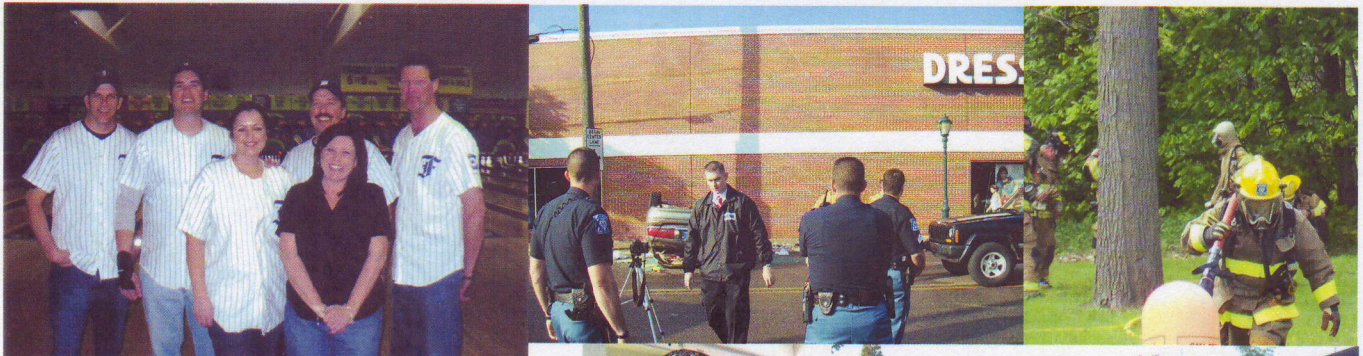

ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS (2008)

- ❖ There were no fire or crime related deaths.
- ❖ No public safety personnel were injured or killed in police or fire activities.
- ❖ Serious "Group A" crime decreased three percent (3%) in 2008. This decrease follows a significant twelve percent (-12%) drop in 2007 crime.
- ❖ Fifteen (15) fewer serious "Group A" crimes occurred in 2008 compared to 2007, and eighty-three (83) fewer "Group A" crimes occurred in 2008, compared to 2006.
- ❖ Total burglaries decreased from thirty-nine (39) in 2007 to thirty-three (33) in 2008 (-15%).
- ❖ Larcenies decreased from one hundred fifty-three (153) in 2007 to one hundred thirty-seven (137) in 2008 (-11%).
- ❖ The public safety department re-opened a twenty-nine (29) year old "cold" case and arrested two (2) subjects responsible for an execution murder during an armed robbery at the Great Scott supermarket on January 27, 1979.
- ❖ Aggressive drunk driving enforcement resulted in one hundred eight-two (182) drunk driving arrests, one of the highest numbers ever recorded by the Farmington Public Safety Department.
- ❖ The public safety department recorded four hundred thirteen (413) property damage accidents in 2008, eighty-seven (87) fewer than 2007.
- ❖ The public safety department replaced six (6) mobile data computers (MDC) in all six (6) patrol cars. Data retrieval is significantly faster and the superior technology expanded uses for the MDC's, such as electronic traffic citations.





COMMUNITY POLICING

COMMUNITY POLICING

The Farmington Public Safety Department embraces community partnerships that promote effective police and fire services. Sixty-six (66) special services and programs focus on youth, neighborhoods, roadways and the businesses in our community.

ANIMAL TRAPPING PROGRAM

The department loans animal traps to residents (returnable deposit fee).

BICYCLE SAFETY EVENTS

The Farmington Public Safety Department, along with LOC Federal Credit Union and AAA, sponsors bicycle safety events. The department also sells bicycle licenses to help identify lost or stolen bicycles.

BLOCK PARTIES

Department personnel visit neighborhood block parties with police cars and fire trucks, and distribute crime and fire prevention materials.

BUSINESS WATCH

Special meetings, programs and crime alerts are coordinated with the members of our business community.

CHILD CAR SEAT SAFETY INSPECTION

Citizens can have their child's car seat inspected for safety, proper installation and compliance with State law by the department's fire marshal. The department also has a limited number of free car seats to distribute.

CITIZEN AWARD RECOGNITION PROGRAM

The department recognizes members of the community who assist the public safety department.

CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS

Members of the department are involved in twenty-six police, fire and civic organizations.

CLICK IT OR TICKET

In addition to regular seat belt enforcement, the department participates in annual Memorial Day selective enforcement initiatives. Such initiatives save lives, reduce injuries, and help keep Michigan 94% compliant.

COMMUNITY COALITION WORKSHOPS

Members of the department participate in substance abuse and relationship violence workshops and programs.

COMMISSION ON CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILY

The department participates in the community commission and their events that promote the children, youth and families of our community.

COMPLIANCE CHECKS

The department conducts several annual alcohol and tobacco operations to discourage sales to minors.

CRIME ALERTS

Subscribing residents receive regular e-mail crime alerts, monthly crime reports and crime prevention tips.

CRIME PREVENTION NOTICE PROGRAM

Public safety officers issue crime prevention notices and warnings to residents. Examples include warnings issued to residents who leave valuables unattended, doors unlocked or garage doors open.

CRIME WATCH WEBSITE

Farmingtonpublicsafety.com is the web address. The site features crime statistics, Neighborhood Watch information, annual reports and other items of interest.

CROP WALK

The department coordinates participation and the safety of three hundred annual walkers who raise money for the needy.

CROSSING GUARD PROGRAM

The department hires, manages and conducts annual training for school crossing guards at designated schools.

DECOY CARS

The department strategically places unoccupied patrol vehicles on streets to deter speeding and in business areas to discourage crime.

FARMINGTON YOUTH ASSISTANCE

Department members attend board meetings and make appropriate referrals as an alternative to criminal prosecution.

FIRE INSPECTION PROGRAM

The department is proactive in conducting fire inspections to reduce loss of life and property.

FIRE SAFETY/PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The department conducts various fire safety education programs to pre-schools and other community groups.

FIRST AID, EMERGENCY PROGRAM

The department participates in several educational programs such as the Emergency Preparedness Commission.

FOOT BEAT PATROLS

Public Safety Officers are assigned to foot patrols in the downtown center and at special events.

FRAUD-NET

Detectives fight fraud and bank crimes with an on-line data base linking bankers and law enforcement officers. The partnership promotes crime prevention and helps solve crimes.

GUN LOCK GIVEAWAY PROGRAM

The department gives away free locks to residents to promote gun safety.

HALLOWEEN FESTIVAL, CANDY PATROL

The department participates in the safety coordination at special Halloween events. Special patrols target neighborhoods and officers give away Halloween treats.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM

Commander Warthman and Fire Marshal Madeline represent Farmington on the Western Oakland County Hazardous Materials Response Team.

HOLIDAY ALCOHOL ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

This award winning program utilizes public education, compliance operations, special patrols and partnering with several community organizations and the business community.

HOUSE CHECK PROGRAM

Residents may notify the department when their homes may be vacant for a period of time. The information is kept in dispatch and is helpful when the need arises to contact the homeowner should a crime or emergency occurs.

INTERNSHIP TRAINING

College students or individuals interested in public safety who reside or work in Farmington may apply for internship training and education.

JAIL DIVERSION PROGRAM

Public safety personnel are trained to divert mentally ill prisoners into treatment facilities as an alternative to jail.

KNOX BOX PROGRAM

The department coordinates the installation of security boxes for elderly or handicap residents. The boxes contain keys to allow public safety personnel easy emergency access.

LOST AND FOUND ANIMALS

The department logs lost animal information to help locate owners when animals are found.

MICHIGAN COMMUNITY CHILD WATCH

This program operates in conjunction with Farmington Public Schools. Community members are screened and homes are identified where children may seek safe haven.

MiHAN

The department partnered with the Michigan Health Alert Network to electronically receive critical emergency public health information. Public safety officers utilize the information to properly respond to public health emergencies.

MISSING CHILDREN PROGRAMS

The department participates in child identification efforts. Policies and procedures are in place for quick activation of "Amber Alert" and "A Child Is Missing" programs. One thousand residents a minute can be notified by telephone to watch for a child.

MOUNTAIN BIKE PROGRAM

The department has three mountain bikes used by officers at special events and during specific tactical operations.

MULTICULTURAL, MULTIRACIAL COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The department is represented on the steering committee and participates in the philosophies and programs of this important group.

NARCOTICS SUPPRESSION UNIT (NSU)

Specially selected officers investigate illegal drug tips, execute search warrants and arrests drug offenders.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

The department conducts monthly meetings with residents to teach crime prevention and provide crime updates. Special crime alert bulletins are delivered by community policing officers to neighborhoods experiencing crime.

OPERATION SAFE RIDE

The department partners this project with Mothers Against Drunk Driving to coordinate safe rides home for individuals consuming excess alcohol at New Year's.

PARADE PARTICIPATION

The department participates and ensures community safety at the Little League Parade, Homecoming Parade, Memorial Day Parade and Founder's Festival Parade.

PARENT FORUMS

The department partners with the Farmington Public Schools to present annual crime prevention programs at parent educational forums.

POLICE BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION

The Farmington Public Safety Department, Farmington Hills police and fire departments and the Franklin Police Department hosts an annual golf outing, dinner, raffle, and live and silent auctions. The event raises funds to assist public safety personnel, their families and members of the general public during times of death, illness or personal crisis.

PRIVATE PROPERTY ACCIDENT PROGRAM

The department responds to private property vehicle crashes, preserves the peace and records the facts on a police report.

PUBLIC SAFETY TOURS AND PRESENTATIONS

The department provides tours of the public safety building, vehicles, and responds to all public safety requests for speakers and presentations.

RECRUITMENT PROGRAM

The department actively recruits officer candidates at universities, colleges and academies.

RESERVE OFFICER PROGRAM

The department recruits, screens and trains members of the community who supplement police, fire and civil defense protection.

SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER PROGRAM

This successful program has serviced all Farmington public high schools since 1990. Officer Christine Schutz is assigned to Farmington High School. She provides on site support to school administration, provides classroom instruction, serves as a connection with students, provides special presentations to parent groups, serves on various school committees, conducts crime prevention and enforcement, and investigates criminal matters occurring at the school.

SCHOOL SAFETY PROGRAM

The department is prepared to respond to all types of school and community emergencies. The Farmington School District Director of Safe Schools and department personnel meet regularly and discuss concerns and safety issues. The public safety department maintains a special vehicle equipped with emergency equipment should a serious incident require a rapid response.

SELECTIVE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

Patrol officers conduct weekly selective traffic enforcement details at various locations throughout the city, several at the request of residents and Traffic and Safety Board members.

SERVICE COMPLIANCE PROGRAM

The department promotes professional traffic stops and maintains a formal compliant procedure. The department also utilizes in-car cameras to verify professional conduct and recreate a factual record of public contacts.

SMOKE ALARM GIVE AWAY PROGRAM

The department provides free, battery operated, smoke detectors to residents of the community.

SOBRIETY COURT HOME VISIT PROGRAM

Commander Putt, Sergeant DuLong, Sergeant Friess, PSO Schutz and PSO Morche visit the homes of residents arrested for drunken driving to encourage sobriety.

SPECIAL EVENT COORDINATION

The department plans and coordinates public safety personnel for special community events. Special operational orders are written defining department procedures.

SPECIAL PATROL PROGRAMS

The department identifies areas for special tactical patrols of uniformed or plain clothes officers. The department also honors requests for special attention patrols from residents and business owners.

SPEED TRAILER PROGRAM

The department identifies areas requiring "speed awareness" and "deterrence." A strategically placed trailer informs passing motorists of their speed. The department honors reasonable suggestions for trailer placement from residents and business owners.

START

The department participates in the Safe Therapeutic Response Team. Investigators are partnered with specially trained forensic nurses to collect sexual assault evidence and counsel sexual assault victims.

TEDDY BEAR GIVE AWAY PROGRAM

The department stocks devoted teddy bears to give to children who are involved in traumatic events.

T.H.I.N.K. PROGRAM

Teaching, Helping, Involving, and Noticing Kids (THINK) is the department's 5th grade drug education program. Graduates receive certificates of achievement and t-shirts.

TOURS

The department conducts station tours and demonstrations for residents and community groups.

TRACVIEW

Citizens involved in vehicle crashes and their insurance companies can purchase accident reports electronically.

TRAFFIC AND SAFETY BOARD

The department acts as a liaison with the city's traffic board and traffic engineer. Public safety officers encourage citizens with unsolved traffic concerns to contact the Traffic Safety Board.

TURN AROUND PROGRAM

Students at Farmington schools who turn their lives around in a positive manner are honored at an annual banquet. The department is a major sponsor and members serve on the planning and nominations committees.

VEHICLE LOCK OUT PROGRAM

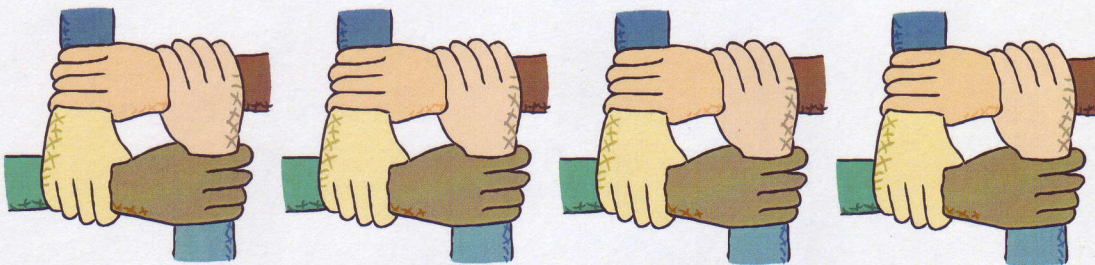


WASTE WATCH

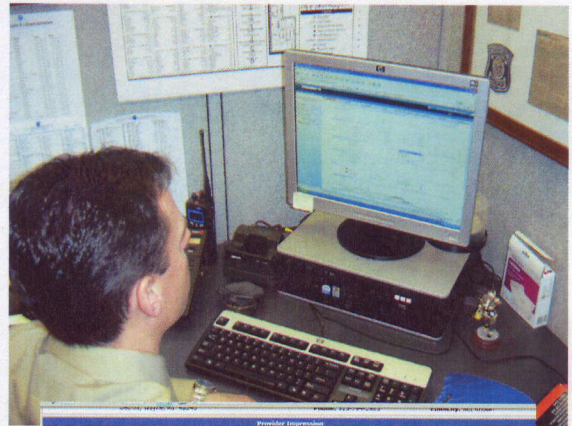

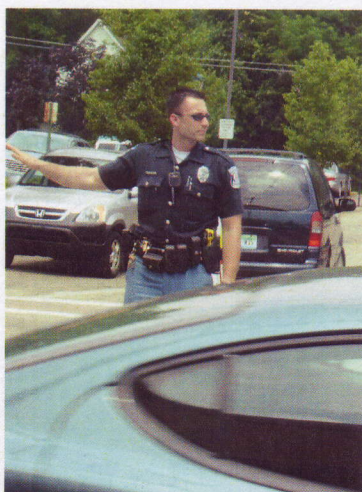
PATROL DIVISION

PATROL DIVISION

The uniform patrol division was led by Commanders Maria Putt, Terrance Purves and Theodore Warthman in 2008. Commander Putt subsequently retired in late November after twenty-five years of distinguished service to the city and department. Four sergeants; Justin DuLong, Jeffrey Brow, Richard Friess and Todd Anderson, assist the commanders. Nine public safety officers are assigned to the patrol division: Richard Hennessy, Scott Herrmann, Aaron Malewski, Mark Keeley, Scott Brown, Paul Houhanisin, Andrew Morche, Shane Wash and William Wood.

The patrol division is responsible for providing the primary response to police, medical and fire emergencies. Each member of the patrol division attends regular training to increase their knowledge and practical skills in each discipline. Fire and medical trainings are held each month at the Farmington Public Safety training center. Patrol division officers attend police trainings at various locations in the area. Examples of some police training attended by the patrol division in 2008 include: Michigan-Legal Update, Active Shooter Response, Accident Investigation and Edge Weapons Defense.

The patrol division provides numerous community policing services. For example, our officers patrol neighborhoods and issue crime prevention notices indicating potential criminal opportunities, hazards or concerns observed at a residence. Station tours, visiting block parties, picking up stray pets, assisting residents who have fallen, home/vehicle lockouts, selective enforcement on neighborhood streets and any other request for assistance from citizens are just some of the services that the patrol division provides and residents enjoy.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

The Officer-in-Charge of the Special Operations Bureau is Commander Frank Demers. The commander supervises Detective Alan Baranski, Detective Patrick Spelman, and School Liaison Officer Christine Schutz. The Fire Marshal, Sergeant Reginald Madeline, is also assigned to the Special Operations Bureau.

Special Operations personnel are responsible for some of the following functions; criminal investigations, evidence technician services, photography, fire inspections, fire equipment maintenance, reserve public safety officer and reserve fire fighter background investigations, Neighborhood Watch, evidence and property room management, school liaison program, solicitor permits, alcohol, tobacco and massage compliance operations.

In 2008, Special Operations personnel received specialized training on the topics of homicide investigations, electronic storage investigations, evidence technician certification, arson investigation, "The Art of Reading Smoke", Weapons of Mass Destruction Radiological/Nuclear Responder Operations, and Sudden Death In-Custody investigations.

In addition to the above, Fire Marshal Madeline successfully completed training as a certified fire inspector. He also became a certified fire instructor for the state of Michigan in 2008.

The Investigations Division of the Special Operations Bureau is one of the most challenging positions within the department. Detectives manage heavy caseloads and handle other critical tasks for the department on a daily basis. One of the highlights of 2008 was the arrest of two men responsible for the 1979 murder of a clerk at the former Great Scott Supermarket. Farmington police worked closely with investigators from the Oakland County Sheriff's Office and the Oakland County Prosecutors office to finally bring charges against the men after nearly 30 years.

The following is a summary of the number of cases and other duties handled by the division in 2008:

- 201 Criminal investigations
- 108 Warrants obtained
- 9 Juvenile petitions filed
- 5 Massage facility background investigations
- 1 Liquor license background investigation

The Narcotics Suppression Unit (NSU), formed in 2007, is also a branch of the Special Operations Bureau. The unit is comprised of three officers who have received specialized training in the area of narcotics investigations.

In 2008, NSU officers investigated 20 narcotics related tips which led to the identification of several persons involved in the use and/or sale of illegal drugs. NSU officers assisted in the execution of 4 search warrants which led to the arrests of 6 persons for narcotic and property crime related violations. Farmington NSU strives to work with the community, along with regional drug task forces, to suppress narcotic activity and other crimes in the City of Farmington.

FIRE SERVICE

The Farmington fire service, under the direction of Fire Marshal Reginald Madeline, provides fire and emergency medical services to the community. The Fire Marshal conducts fire inspections and site plan reviews, schedule and performs maintenance on Farmington's fire apparatus, coordinates monthly fire fighting and medical training. All sworn personnel are trained to a Michigan Firefighter II level and public safety officers are trained medical first responders. Three members of the department have advanced medical training and are licensed emergency medical technicians. Some other services provided by the Farmington fire service include; fire extinguishment, hazardous materials response, smoke detector give away program, public education seminars on fire safety, and first aid. Due to quick response times and quality training, the fire loss in the past year is estimated at \$345,139.00

RECORDS & DISPATCH

RECORDS AND DISPATCH

Records/Communications Supervisor Corinne Brazzil supervises five dispatchers; John Foxtan, Danielle Shorrock, Jennifer Jordan, Jo-Ann Alcantara, Sean Skinner and one part-time clerk Debra Comini.

The dispatch center serves as a Public Safety Answering Point (P.S.A.P.) for police and fire services. The public safety department remained the test site during 2008 for the Oakland County 800 frequency radio system.

In 2008, the dispatchers handled 6,624 calls for service. They also handled numerous calls for directions, court inquiries, reports of stray and lost animals, and other general information. Farmington's dispatch center is staffed twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

Records personnel process all requests for reports (police, fire, medical and accidents), including Freedom of Information requests. They are also responsible for the processing of court dockets and subpoenas, false alarm billing, bicycle licenses, parking permits, non-criminal fingerprints, police clearance letters, warrant processing/validations and requests for station tours.

TRAINING PROGRAMS

TRAINING

The public safety department continues to seek out excellent training opportunities for both sworn and civilian personnel. The following pages will detail the training courses that personnel have attended over the year.

As in prior years, the department took full advantage of training at no cost. The following is a list of such training:

- **Flash Over Training:** Flash over is a condition during a structure fire when temperatures reach a point where all of the rooms contents and gases ignite instantly. This training taught staff the warning signs and tactics to prevent flash over. Firefighters caught in a flash over will be seriously injured or killed. Wixom Fire Department sponsored this training and as a member of the Western Oakland Mutual Aid Association (WOMAA), the department was allowed to attend at no cost.



- **Sudden Deaths In-Custody:** This training was sponsored by Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority and taught staff about response issues (policy/procedures) and Restraint Stress an Excited Delirium.
- **Datamaster:** This training was sponsored by the State of Michigan and certified PSO Wood in the use of the Datamaster (breath test instrument for drunken driving arrest).
- **Domestic Violence:** This training was sponsored by the Oakland County Coordinating Council Against Domestic Violence and taught dispatchers the key role they play in domestic violence cases.

- **Responding to Mercury Spills:** This training was sponsored by the Southeastern Michigan Fire Inspectors Society and taught the effects of mercury on humans and how to respond to small or large scale mercury spills.
- **Mental Health:** This training was sponsored by the Oakland Sheriff Department and provided training on how to approach mentally ill people and treatment resources available.
- **Freedom of Information Act:** This training was sponsored by Law Enforcement Records Management Association and provided a review of FOIA and how to response to FOIA request.
- **E-Team:** This training was sponsored by Oakland County Emergency Management. Personnel learned to use the State of Michigan's electronic reporting system for large scale emergencies.
- **Cool Tools for Investigators:** This training was sponsored by CLEMIS and trained staff about the different databases available to help solve crimes.
- **Instructor Development:** This training was sponsored by Wayne Community College and provided Sergeant/Fire Marshal Madeline with the skills to become state certified as a fire instructor.
- **Flammable Gas Emergencies:** This training was sponsored by Independence Fire Department and provides training on handling flammable gases that are leaking from a container or are burning.
- **Transportation Emergencies:** This training was sponsored by the United States Department of Energy and provided training on vehicles involved in accidents that are transporting radiological material.

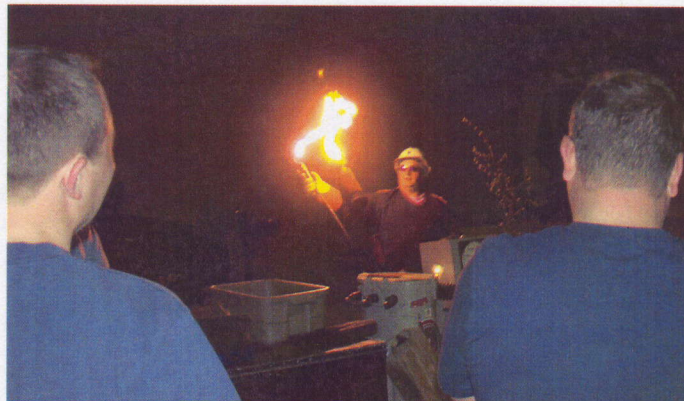

2008 NEW GRANTS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The public safety department seeks annual supplemental funding sources through grants and partnerships to enhance services and reduce taxpayer expenses. This section of the Annual Report summarizes some of the 2008 funding initiative in 2008.

BLOOD WITHDRAWAL PROTOCOL

The Farmington Public Safety Department partnered with Botsford Hospital, Community EMS and the Botsford Physicians Group to establish a new blood protocol for persons arrested for drunk driving. Drunk driver blood samples will be taken at the Farmington Public Safety Department, instead of transporting prisoners to the hospital. The program will save time, money and increase safety. The protocol will be implemented in early 2009.

CRIME PREVENTION PUBLICATION

The Farmington Public Safety Department authored a "Legal Consequences" brochure "What Every Parent Needs to Know," for the Farmington/Farmington Hills Call to Action Community Coalition. The brochure was printed utilizing drug forfeiture funds.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM GRANT

The Farmington Public Safety Department, Farmington Hills Fire Department, Farmington Hills Police Department, Farmington Hills channel 8 and the Oakland County Health Department combined resources to present a theatrical style comedy play entitled; "Being Prepared with Suzanna Montana." The production was presented at all elementary schools in Farmington and Farmington Hills.

MOCK DISASTER DRILL

On October 1, 2008, the Farmington Public Safety Department, Farmington Hills Fire Department, Farmington Hills Police Department, Livonia Fire Department, Southfield Fire Department, Novi Fire Department, Community EMS, and Botsford Hospital conducted a mock disaster at the old 47th District Court building. The group established a unified command post during an active shooter, mass casualty exercise.

SELF CONTAINED BREATHING APPARATUS (SCBA) GRANT

The public safety department received an "Assistance to Firefighter" grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in the amount of \$60,825. The grant is for ten (10) SCBA's, twenty-three (23) face pieces, thirty-three (33) carry bags and Rapid Intervention Team (RIT) equipment. All of the equipment will be purchased and issued in early 2009.





MAJOR CRIME

2008 MAJOR CRIME CASES

The following incidents are a synopsis of serious crimes against persons and/or high profile incidents receiving community wide attention in 2008.

JANUARY 1, 2008 – FIRE INJURIES

A fifteen year old male and female were severely burned when gasoline was poured onto a backyard bonfire on Hawthorne.

JANUARY 29 & 31, 2008 – ARMED ROBBERIES

A masked robber was arrested on Grand River while attempting to flee a robbery at Living Health vitamin shop. The eighteen year old drug addicted individual committed a robbery two days earlier at Skateboard Plus in downtown Farmington.

JANUARY 30, 2008 – IDENTITY THEFT/FRAUD

Farmington detectives executed a raid and search warrant in Detroit to arrest a mother and daughter involved in a telephone scam to obtain personal information to commit credit card fraud.

FEBRUARY 13, 2008 – BANK ROBBERY

A forty-two year old man suffering from drug addictions was arrested for robbing the TCF Bank at Nine Mile and Farmington.

FEBRUARY 15, 2008 – HAIR SALON BURGLARIES

On February 15, 2008, a male and female were arrested for two Farmington hair salon burglaries that occurred in January.

MARCH 11, 2008 – COUNTERFEIT CHECKS

A forty-one year old man involved in a serial payroll check fraud scam was arrested as he left the Farmington Flagstar Bank.

MARCH 15, 2008 – GARAGE BURGLARY

A twenty-two year old Farmington man addicted to cocaine was arrested for a garage burglary on Drake Heights.

MARCH 25, 2008 – HOUSE FIRE

A heater with a crimped electrical cord was responsible for a fire on Orchard Lake Road. The family escaped after awakened by a family pet.

APRIL 5, 2008 – ARMED ROBBERY

Two employees inside Plato's restaurant at 9:30 p.m. were robbed and bound with duct tape by an unknown male.

APRIL 11, 2008 – HOME INVASION

Solicitors employed to rake leaves on Floral Street burglarized the home. Farmington detectives located the suspects after tracking use of credit cards stolen from the home.

APRIL 18, 2008 – COUNTERFEIT CHECKS

A male and female were arrested while fleeing the Farmington Flagstar Bank after attempting to cash a counterfeit check. Farmington detectives executed a search warrant in Southfield where drugs and counterfeiting evidence was seized.

MAY 10, 2008 – ROOFING ACCIDENT

A resident on Hillcrest was tragically killed after falling from his roof.

MAY 15, 2008 – FRAUD/FORGERY

Farmington detectives executed search warrants in Detroit and Southfield to recover evidence against a twenty-four year old man responsible for stealing \$20,770 from a seventy-seven year old Farmington man's bank account.

MAY 20, 2008 – ASSAULT AND BATTERY

A forty-seven year old man was arrested for inappropriately touching a nineteen year old female at the downtown Starbuck's. The man inappropriately touched or approached several women. He was also charged with a sex offense in Dearborn.

MAY 21, 2008 – PROPANE ACCIDENT

A man filling a propane tank at D&W Oil was burned after a shut off valve failed on a propane gas tank. A hazardous materials response was required to safely release the remaining propane from the tank.

JUNE 19, 2007 – OLD MURDER SOLVED

The Farmington Public Safety Department held a press conference to announce the arrest of two men wanted for the robbery and execution murder at the Great Scott supermarket on January 27, 1979.

JUNE 24, 2008 – CREDIT CARD FRAUD

Farmington detectives executed a search warrant in Detroit where numerous stolen credit cards and gift cards were seized. A resident on Alta Loma was victimized after someone stole their identity to commit credit card fraud.

JULY 7, 2008 – CLUBHOUSE BURGLARY

Three subjects were arrested for burglarizing and vandalizing the clubhouse at Drakeshire Apartments.

JULY 18, 2008 – FRAUD

Farmington detectives arrested a home health care worker for stealing money from an elderly person's bank accounts.

JULY 29, 2008 – SCHOOL BURGLARIES

Five teens were arrested on the roof of the Maxfield Training Center. Some of the teens were responsible for burglaries at Longacre Elementary and Power Middle School.

AUGUST 18, 2008 – VEHICLE ROLLOVER

A seventy-nine year old man suffered a medical condition and drove his vehicle onto a utility guideline that flipped the car, pinning the driver and closing Grand River.

AUGUST 27, 2008 – HOME INVASION

Two neighborhood teens were arrested for burglarizing a home on Heatherston and stealing a laptop computer.

SEPTEMBER 3, 2008 – SEXUAL ASSAULT

A thirty-five year old man was arrested for having sexual encounters with a thirteen year old girl at an apartment on Grand River.

SEPTEMBER 8, 2008 – RESIDENTIAL ROBBERY

An elderly couple was robbed when they arrived home to their residence in Chatham Hills subdivision. Farmington detectives traced evidence to a subject who was arrested for similar robberies in Detroit. Farmington detectives expect an arrest warrant to be issued in early 2009.

OCTOBER 2, 2008 – ARMED ROBBERY

A man asked for a menu and employment application at Papa John's pizzeria. The same unknown man committed robberies in Farmington Hills, Livonia and other area cities.

OCTOBER 13, 2008 – BUSINESS BURGLARY

A former employee was arrested for an earlier business burglary at Coldstone Creamery.

OCTOBER 22, 2008 – EMBEZZLEMENT

A Cub Scout pack treasurer was arrested for embezzling \$7,200 from the scout treasury.

NOVEMBER 21, 2008 – LARCENY FROM AUTO

Charges were issued against two Novi men who admitted to stealing from one hundred cars in Farmington, Farmington Hills, Novi and other area communities during the fall of 2008.

NOVEMBER 29, 2008 – PEDESTRIAN FATALITY

A thirty-five year old man was tragically killed at the downtown Farmington library when he was struck by his unoccupied vehicle as the tires ran over his pregnant wife.

DECEMBER 12 & 14, 2008 – APARTMENT FIRES

An apartment unit at Chatham Hills Apartments was destroyed by a room fire caused by a crimped electrical cord connected to an entertainment center. An apartment was destroyed at Sunview Apartments when an aerosol can next to a candle exploded.

DECEMBER 19, 2008 – COUNTERFEITING

A nineteen year old man was arrested for passing fake \$100 bills at several businesses at the downtown center.

DECEMBER – OPERATION I.C.E.

The Farmington Public Safety Department participated in a regional Inter County Enforcement (I.C.E.) undercover operation to arrest two hundred six (206) dangerous felons wanted on outstanding warrants.
